Physical Evidence:

This single storey brick residence has a complex plan form with a pitched and gabled roof clad with coloured corrugated metal sheeting. It is probable the original building was a simple rectangular form with verandahs across the front elevation addressing Owen Road.

It is not known how much of the original mud brick remains to be seen internally, externally the place is constructed of painted brick and multi pane casement windows, and later style French doors. Portions of the external walls feature unpainted face brick, and another is painted weatherboard.

The verandah across the front elevation is created through the extension of the roof, supported on simple timber posts. The floor of the verandah is brick paving.

The residence is located within a large lot that features mature trees and shrubs with a plumbago hedge across the front boundary.

History of Place / Site:

This residence was constructed in 1888 by Dr Alfred Waylen and his business partner Josceline Amherst to provide accommodation for the manager of the Darlington Vineyard, Charles E Mumme and his family. The vineyard was the first major development in the region which lead to the settlement of the region and investment.

The Vineyard declined and in 1902, the property was offered for sale and this residence was described as 'Darlington House'.

In 1923, the property was transferred to the V. Reilly and it is understood this is when it was first leased to Auber and Maryan (Gypsy) Neville. Auber Octavius Neville (1875-1954) was the Protector of Aborigines from 1915-1936. A position that held immense power over the Aboriginal people of the state.

The Nevilles later purchased the property and named it 'Windyridge' and it is likely they undertook some alterations and additions during the occupation. The plumbago hedge



across the front property boundary dates from their occupancy. The Neville's were very active in the sports and social life of Darlington.

Janet Curlewis bought 5 Owen Rd on the 9th February 1942 from the Neville family and it was in the Curlewis family until sold by her son Brian Curlewis in 1963 to Harold Francis Henderson. Harold lived here up to his death in 1983. It is believed that the mud brick was clad with contemporary brick at this time. The original earthen floor was replaced and raised with the roof and walls also being raised altering the roof line.

Aerial photographs indicate that since the mid 20th century several programs of additions and alterations have been undertaken.



Physical Evidence:

There is limited evidence of the physical form of this place. A view from the street shows a projecting bay with a gable and centrally placed triple windows again projecting from the bay. An awning is located above the windows. The walls are painted masonry with foundations of random rubble stonework, with stonework above to sill height.

The roof is tiled with corrugated metal sheeting.

The buildings are set in a bushland setting and features many mature trees. Behind the residence are several additional buildings. A random rubble stone wall is located on the front property boundary and pillars define the entrance to the property.

History of Place / Site:

It has not been firmly established when this residence was built. In 1954, an item in the 'Swan Express' refers to Mr and Mrs Thomas residing at 'Carraboya'. It is possible the house was built in the early 1950s for the Thomases, or it was purchased by them as an existing residence. Further research may resolve this issue.

The physical evidence suggests the place was built in the Inter War period. Aerial photographs indicate that a large addition was constructed across the rear of the residence in the 1970s and the roof clad in corrugated metal sheeting in 2017.

This place was the stained-glass studio of Gowers and Brown. Edward (Ted) Gowers and Albert Brown arrived in Perth from England in February 1954. They established a stained glass studio in Cottesloe and immediately began making stained glass windows for churches in the Perth metropolitan area. Their first windows were a commission for St Giles Congregational Church in Mt Lawley (Light of the World) and three windows in the baptistry of St Patrick's Anglican Church, Mt Lawley. St Giles, Mt Lawley has since been demolished but the stained glass window was reinstalled in the new Uniting Church, Mt Lawley. All four windows from these two commissions were installed in December 1954. Other commissions swiftly followed.

Their burgeoning business required that they find larger premises and in 1958 they purchased 'Carraboya' from Mrs Rhonda Thomas (nee Hardie) which included the adjacent lot 30 Old York Road. The origin of the name is not known.

Gowers and Brown moved to the property in December 1958. Following their move to this larger property, the expanding business required additional assistance and so they began to take on apprentices. It is not known precisely how many apprentices they trained, but several of them went on to establish studios of their own.

The firm designed and installed hundreds of stained glass windows throughout Western Australia and also interstate. Examples of their work in the Shire of Mundaring can be found in St Cuthbert's Anglican Church, Darlington and in the Anglican Church of the Epiphany, Mundaring.



Gowers and Brown not only designed religious windows but also carried out numerous private commissions for private residences and institutions, for example the WA School of Nursing and, what was then the Mt Lawley Teacher's College. Examples of their private commissions in the Shire of Mundaring can be found in Glen Forrest and Darlington.

They pioneered the technique of concrete and glass in the state, designing their own equipment for this process. They began experimenting with this technique in 1960, converting what had been an old chook pen as a studio for this new technique. They sought advice from English glass artists but found that Western Australia's hotter conditions meant that they had to essentially find new ways of setting the concrete before it dried too quickly. They found that the best method for drying the panels was by steam curing, much to the amazement of the English studios who used only heat. Their first big commission for this style of window came from the Christian Brothers in Perth for their new chapel at Trinity College in East Perth. This large commission was completed by 25 December 1961. The windows comprised a total area of 672 sq ft (62.43 sq m) and at the time, represented the largest area of concrete and glass produced in either Australia or the United Kingdom.

They then went on to install concrete and glass windows in Geraldton's Anglican Cathedral and Aquinas College's Chapel. As their technique was so innovative, Ted Gowers was invited to deliver a paper for the Cement and Concrete Association of Australia's conference in Perth in 1964. A local example of this technique can be seen in St Cuthbert's Anglican Church, Darlington. Unfortunately, a bushfire totally destroyed this studio, together with a large quantity of Norman slab glass in December 1994. Following their death their method they pioneered died with them.

Albert Brown died in January 1996 when the firm were in the midst of installing stained glass windows in St Lawrence, Dalkeith. Ted Gowers had to finish this commission without his long-time partner. He continued working for some years afterwards, producing windows with the help of two former apprentices. He died in August 2012 and the house passed to a former apprentice.

- This place is associated with the prominent and influential firm of stained-glass artists, Gowers and Brown, who designed and manufactured many significant works for Western Australian churches. They developed new techniques and trained many apprentices in this art form, from 1958 to 2012.
- The place was the home of Ted Gowers and Arthur Brown from 1958 until 2012 and demonstrates the form and detail of the Inter War Californian Bungalow style.
- The place has social value for its presence in the streetscape and its association with Gowers and Brown and therefore contributes to the community sense of place.



Recommendation/Conservation Strategy

Conservation of the place is desirable. Any alterations or extensions should reinforce the significance of the place and retain original fabric where feasible.



Access was not gained for this assessment

History of Place / Site:

This residence was built c1956 for Dr Alexander Thomas Hicks Jolly, his wife Barbara Eugenie Smallpage and their family.

Dr Alexander Thomas Hicks Jolly was a well known General Practitioner who was the first doctor in Australia to prescribe the use of cortisone and the first to use ultrasound for joint and muscle issues. He was a member of the Communist Party of Australia and run as a Communist candidate for Local, State and Federal Parliament and served as a councillor for the Midland Junction Municipality. He was a close associate of local writer Katharine Susannah Prichard and Frederick and Bernice Ranford who were also members of the Communist Party of Australia.

The house had one of the first swimming pools in the district.

Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that the grounds of the property have diminished in condition and the form and extent of the residence are consistent with its original design.



Physical Evidence:

This single storey timber framed residence has a rectangular plan form and a pitched roof clad in corrugated sheet metal. The roof extends in a broken pitch to cover the verandah on the north elevations. The remainder of the elevations appear to be enclosed verandahs, or skillion additions.

The walls are clad in weatherboard to sill height and fibre cement sheeting above. The windows are metal framed.

The residence is located on a gently sloping site that enables direct access to the interior of the building on the southern elevation, and the north elevation is elevated. On the north elevation the verandah is accessed by timber stairs and timber balustrades are 'St Andrews Cross' style.

The residence is set in a large lot which is predominantly grassed with mature trees on the property boundary. A large shed on the Newton Street side of the property obscures the view of the original residence.

History of Place / Site:

This house was the home of Albert Facey (1894-1982) and his wife Evelyn Mary Gibson (1897–1976). The couple had lived in many towns in Western Australia before settling in Mount Helena in the early 1950s. Albert Facey was self-employed poultry and pig farmer and businessman and served on the Mundaring Roads Board as a councillor and also Chairman of the board for 1956-57. He retired in 1958 following a major heart attack. This is the home Albert Facey occupied during the time he served on the Mundaring Road Board.

In 1981, Albert Facey rose to notoriety with the publication of his best-selling auto biography, 'A Fortunate Life' which has subsequently been realised in film and on the stage. The book celebrates the life of Albert Facey and the communities in which he lived and worked.

From the readily available information and the physical evidence, this residence was built in the 1930s. The previous occupants and builder of the residence have not been determined.

In 1953, Albert and Evelyn Facey moved into the home which was transferred to Evelyn Facey on 25 May 1953.



In 1958, Albert Facey suffered a major heart attack, and in 1959 the couple sold the house and relocated to another property closer to medical services.

Aerial photographs suggest that the lot included a small orchard of fruit trees around the house. The current owners believe the substantial rose bush in the front garden may date from the time of the original construction or soon after.

Since the 1980s, the house has been extended to the north although the original form and extent of the residence can be determined. Other later structures on the lot date from c2013 and have no heritage value.

Physical Evidence:

The brick school building which is incorporated into the complex which is the Marloo Theatre is a simple one room classroom of brick with a gabled roof. Evidence of the windows which were formerly along the long elevation can be seen in the contrasting brick used to fill the openings.

On one elevation a former verandah has been enclosed with fibre cement sheeting.

History of Place / Site:

Greenmount Primary School was established on this site in 1913. The first school was a rented premises and at the opening of the school attended by dignitaries it was stated that if numbers were maintained the Education Department would build a dedicated school building.

This must have occurred as tenders were called by the Public Works Department in 1914 and in December of that year contractor J. Wallace was announced as the successful and lowest tenderer.

The school continued to operate at this site until the early 1960s when the new school was opened on Innamincka Road.

The first school building was largely unused on the site until 1984 when it was added to and adapted for the Darlington Theatre Players. The buildings have been the venue for the Darlington Theatre Players since then.

There is no evidence of the former railway station remaining at this site.

History of Place / Site:

Greenmount Railway Station was located on the First Route of the Eastern Railway operated between 11 March 1884 and 24 January 1954.

The station was situated on land bounded by Scott Street (Wilkie Road), Coulston Road and Coongan Avenue. The station serviced passengers from Greenmount and Boya and also provided a spur line in and out of the neighbouring Greenmount Quarry.

The alignment of the former railway line is now the site of a Heritage Walking Trail.



Physical Evidence:

This single storey concrete block shop premises is of a rectangular plan form with the main façade located on the front property boundary.

The main façade is the most striking feature of the building with a stepped parapet obscuring a simple gable roof clad with corrugated metal sheeting. The façade is rendered and dominated by large steel framed windows in a regular panels alongside a timber entry door with fan lights above and on one side.

The block used in the construction of the building appear to be concrete blocks featuring a moulded design. The overall condition is poor and it no longer functions as a retail premises.

History of Place / Site:

From the readily available information this commercial premises was built by Guiseppe Spadaccini in the late 1940s or early 1950s. The lot was formally approved for subdivision in 1952.

The blocks used in the construction of the building appear to be concrete blocks featuring a moulded design replicating stonework. This was a not uncommon material in the period following World War II when building materials were is short supply. It was often used in self build projects and this may have been the case in this instance.

Guiseppe Spadaccini (c1901-1985) born in Istonia, Italy travelled to Australia in c1927 and became a naturalised citizen in 1945. His wife Grazia di Biase and their son Michele (Michael) arrived in WA in 1934.

It is not clear if the Spadaccini family operated the store from this premises or if they leased it to others. Guiseppe Spadaccini identified his occupation as a farm labourer in the Electoral Rolls and Michael Spadaccini was a photographer. The Spadaccini family lived in Talbot Road Swan View.

The building to the rear of the shop was built between 1953 and 1961.

The origin of the name 'Hobbsy's Store' is not known.



Physical Evidence:

From the views available, this residence has a simple square and symmetrical plan form. It is constructed of timber frame with weather board cladding. The roof is corrugated metal sheeting. Verandahs encircle the building, although some sections have been enclosed

The main elevation verandah roof is supported on simple timber posts.

The main entrance is centrally located, with two pane casement windows located either side.

A wall topped with a picket fence is located on the front property boundary.

History of Place / Site:

From the readily available information this place was built in the 1920s as a homestead for a farming property. Further research may identify the original owners and occupants.

In the first half of the 20th century, Swan View was predominantly used for farming, with orchards and poultry common selections. The lot on which this residence is located is part of the original subdivision formally approved in 1903.

A search of newspapers of the period indicate that some adjacent lots were offered for sale in the 1920s which suggests it is not unreasonable that this place was built in the 1920s.

An aerial view of this property from 1953 shows that the 3.5 hectares of this lot was under crop and extended to the Jane Brook to the west.

Aerial photographs since that time the place show that the place has been used for commercial farming with large sheds across the property for many decades. Whilst the use of the property has changed the form and extent of the original residence has stayed largely unchanged.



Physical Evidence:

There is no evidence of the former brickworks which operated at this site. The levelling of the contours may demonstrate the location of former structures

History of Place / Site:

Edmund Gilyard Lacey arrived as a 37 year old to Western Australia in 1880 after a successful career in the Eastern States set up timber sawmills in Mahogany Creek and Sawyers Valley. Lacey acquired land on the south side of York Road (now Great Eastern Highway) and what is now Wortley Road. He developed a brickworks and quarry at the site in 1897 and operated it until his death in 1901.

The brickworks and quarry were taken over by the Coulthard Brothers (Henry and William) who operated the Hoffman Steam Pressed Brick Company on the site from 1901 to 1924. The site was serviced by a railway siding that came off the First Route of the Eastern Railway and was known as 24 Mile Siding.

This reserve (2851) was created in 1967 for the purposes of recreation and has remained as such since then. It was named 'Stuart Park' because of the adjacent Stuart Street.

The residence is located within a densely planted lot that obscures the view from the street. There are many mature trees on the property.

History of Place / Site:

This residence was built during the mid 1940s for the Ranford Family, comprising Frederick Henry Ranford his wife Bernice Lorraine and their two children. Frederick Ranford served with the AIF during World War II and married Bernice Lee in 1942. From the available evidence they built this house c1948 and the family settled into the Swan View community.

Frederick and Bernice Ranford were close associates with Katharine Susannah Prichard, Dr Alex and Barbara Jolly, all of whom were members of the Communist Party of Australia. The group worked together to influence policy at local and state government level.

Janet Ranford the daughter of Frederick and Bernice married Robert Holmes a Court and has subsequently become a successful business leader and philanthropists.

The main elevation has a verandah across the full width which is created by the extension of the roof line. The verandah roof is supported on simple timber posts.

The main entrance is centrally located, and pairs of windows are located either side.

A carport and garage are located alongside the residence and a timber picket fence defines the front property boundary. The house is located on a sloping site and the rear elevation has a raised verandah with timber balustrades.

The rear elevation is the original front entrance and it presents in as another symmetrical form with a centrally placed door and sash windows either side.

An aerial view of this property from 1953 shows it is surrounded by minimal development. It is also apparent from this image that the front of the residence addressed Welbourn Road. An orchard was located between the residence and Welbourn Road.

Subdivision of this area began in the mid-1970s and this lot was formally approved for subdivision in 1978 creating a new street access. Since that time the place has had some additions to the rear and new buildings have been constructed on the site. The form and extent of the original residence can still be determined.

Physical Evidence:

This single storey residence has a symmetrical plan form with a full width verandah to the front and one side. The roof is corrugated metal sheeting and a chimney pierces the roof cladding.

The verandah roof is an extension of the main roof and is supported on timber posts. St Andrew's cross balustrades are located between the posts. The verandah is elevated and is constructed of timber substructure and the floor is timber. Access to the verandah is via a flight of brick steps.

The timber framed building is clad with weatherboard to sill height and fibre cement sheeting above with battens.

The windows are timber framed casements with six panels per pane. The doors appear to also be timber framed and open onto the verandah, French doors are also evident.

The residence is located within a landscaped garden that features mature trees which obscure the view of the residence from the street. A fence of brick pillars and garrison style metal railings is located on the front property boundary.

History of Place / Site:

From the readily available information this place was built in the 1930s and was located on what was Swan View Sub Lot 32, a 12 acre lot. These large lots were used for farming with poultry farming particularly popular in the first half of the 20th century. The first owners and occupants of this residence are not known. Aerial photograph of the site in 1953 show no evidence of farming activity adjacent to the residence, although a large farm was located to the north.

In the mid-1960s, this portion of Swan View underwent further subdivision and development. This residence retained a larger lot until it underwent further subdivision in 2008 to enable the construction of the residence in the battleaxe lot to the rear.



In the 1960s, the residence was occupied by William and Elizabeth Cousins. William designated his occupation as a crane driver and Elizabeth was described as undertaking Home Duties.

Aerial photographs indicate the building was originally a square with additions undertaken in the early 2000s. The form and extent of the original residence can still be readily determined.

Physical Evidence:

From the available visible evidence this simple cottage demonstrates a square plan form with a symmetrical layout. It has a simple hipped roof clad in corrugated metal sheeting. As far as can be determined the walls are clad with fibre cement boards, which is consistent with the oriignal timber weatherboards.

A separate verandah roof extends from under the eaves and is supported on simple metal posts.

The lot is densely planted with shrubs and mature trees making it difficult to view the property.

History of Place / Site:

This cottage originally formed part of a significant landholding that included land to the north including Christowe Park and creek. The date of the construction of the homestead has not been determined although the documentary evidence suggests it was in the Inter War period. The skillion roof addition across the rear of the cottage is present from at least the mid 20th century.

From 1961 it was home to Anna Mary Maxwell Dear, nee Law (1920-2003) and her family from where she operated a horse-riding school, known as Mrs Dear's Riding School. Anna Law married Robert Frank Dear (1919-1979) in 1942 and the couple had at least three children. Some of the children appear to have been involved in the horse-riding school.

Information from the Midland and Districts Historical Society states that the Riding School was very popular in the 1960s and 1970s. Anna Dear relocated to new premises in Pechey Road in Swan View by 1980.

Aerial photographs indicate that a new large verandah was built across the front and sides of the cottage in the late 1960s and a portion was removed c1975. This is likely to have accommodated the formal subdivision of the land in 1976 which led to the construction of a new residence close to the western property boundary.

Since that time there has been further development in adjacent lots removing the connection to Christowe Park and the creek.

Physical Evidence:

The original portion of this former homestead was a rectangular plan form with a half gabled roof clad in corrugated sheet metal. A verandah is located across the full width of the original residence and a small gablet located in the roof above. The walls are clad with timber weatherboard.

The windows are three pane casements which may date from the original construction, although it has been noted by the current owners that the window on the western side of the original front elevation was the location of the main entrance. It is possible the window was relocated from another elevation. The style of the windows suggests the post war international style although documentary evidence may be found to indicate an earlier period of construction.

The residence is located in a landscaped garden with mature trees. A timber lapped fence is located on the front property boundary obscuring views of the house.

History of Place / Site:

This property originally formed part of a larger landholding that included land to the north stretching to Christowe Creek, now Chistowe Park. No information has been found in this research to determine the original owners or occupants of this property.

Information from the Midland and Districts Historical Society states that the property was used as a stables and many structures were present to the rear of the original homestead. Aerial photographs demonstrate that the residence was in place in 1953 with many outbuildings and a small orchard at the front of the property. It is also clear that the original residence was only the western portion of the current building. A major addition was constructed in 2001, following the garage which was constructed in the late 1990s.

The property was subdivided in 1994 creating separate residential lots to the north which have subsequently been developed.

When comparing photographs of the property from 2013 to the present [2024] it is clear that there have been further alterations and additions to the property.

Physical Evidence:

The only evidence of the former shed on this site is the concrete slab. On the slab is a rock and a plaque which acknowledges the contribution of the volunteers who built the shed.

Wording on the plaque is as follows

This marks the site of the first Swayers Valley Bush Fire Brigade Fire Station which was constructed by Brigade volunteers, using donated materials, in December 1971.

Committee Members at the time of construction were

Mr E McHugh (President)
Mr H Oliver (Vice President)
Mr E Quicke (Secretary / Treasurer
Mr F.A. Watts (retiring Secretary / Treasurer)
Mr R. Sonnerman (Captain)
Mr B. Hall (Fire Control Officer)

The committee and volunteers who constructed the shed acknowledged with thanks, the donations and support received from Wundowie Mills, Bell Bros, the Shire of Mundaring and the Sawers Valley community.

The Brigade later built a new station, attached to the pavilion at the Sawyers Vallery Oval, before finally constructing its current station in Ashstead Street.

History of Place / Site:

In April 1970, the Sawyers Valley Fire Brigade wrote to the Shire of Mundaring requesting a site to build a Station shed as close as possible to the Sawyers Oval. Jarrah Creek Reserve (13734) which was first created in 1911 as a Public Utility, and used as a children's playground, was allocated for Municipal Purposes in October 1970.

Site preparation for the new shed began in April 1971 after the burn season. Prior to this second-hand materials, including corrugated iron, frames, Jarrah posts and steel trusses had been collected by members.



The Shire of Mundaring donated a gravel foundation, the concrete floor was laid for \$126 in November 1971 and the shed completed in December 1971. The final cost of the shed was \$581, which included fixtures, electrics, paint and shed keys.

Materials for the shed were donated from Wundowie Mills, Bell Bros, the Shire of Mundaring, and the Sawyers Valley community.

The Station would house the Brigade's 1956 Austin Fire Truck, which had to be parked outside the station for meetings. The first station was in operation from December 1971 until October 1987, when the Brigade constructed a new station, as an extension to the pavilion, located on Sawyers Oval. Soon after, the original shed was sold to Ron Grout and relocated to his property in Lacey Street, Sawyers Valley.

Around 2007 the Brigade realised that it required a bigger station and looked for a new home. By October 2014 the Brigade had constructed a modern tilt up concrete station in Ashstead Street from where it continues to operate in 2024.

History of Place / Site:

Swan View Primary School was established in 1942 after the area experienced population growth due to surrounding residential development previously students living in Swan View attended Greenmount Primary School in Marloo Road.

The first Swan View Primary School held classes at the Swan View Hall on Salisbury Road and by 1954 demand for more classrooms came after overcrowding was experienced.

The Education Department announced in October 1954 that Esslemont Builders of Welshpool had secured the tender to build three new classrooms at the school's new site at 380 Morrison Road in Swan View. This is the group of three classrooms parallel to Morrison Road. It is featured in the class photos from 1962 shown below.

Since that time the school has grown and been adapted to accommodate the changing standards and population of the students.

Physical Evidence:

This rendered brick and tile residence in the Inter war California Bungalow style has a rectangular plan form with a hipped and gabled roof. The roof is tiled in Marseille pattern roof tils and two rendered chimneys pierce the roof line. The external walls are painted rendered bricks with horizontal bands on the corners defined with a contrast paint.

The site is sloping creating the opportunity for an additional storey at the rear of the building. A separate smaller building is located to the rear of the lot which features a similar design aesthetic.

The front elevation is dominated by a large projecting gable roof over a 'L' shaped verandah. This gable has half timbered detail and is supported on simple columns. Decorative metal balustrades are located between the columns.

The main entrance is located on the front verandah and is accessed via masonry steps that are flanked by small squat pillars at the base of the stairs. Awnings clad with tiles are located over the windows on other elevations. The windows and doors in the original larger residence are timber framed, with leadlight designs. The windows in the smaller building are aluminium framed of a different proportion.

The property features mature plantings in the section between the buildings and the street, and a garage is located on the southern boundary with a driveway connecting to the street.

History of Place / Site:

This property was originally part of a larger property owned by Alexander Ernest Watt (1865-1940). His original home faced Great Eastern Highway on the corner of Bullarra Road (465 Great Eastern Highway which is still extant).

His son, Alexander Stephen George Watt (1898-1986) served with the AIF in World War I and on his return, married Dorothy Thelma Elizabeth Reid in 1922 and together they built Timaru as their family home. The name 'Timaru' is likely to originate with the New Zealand town of that name. The architect and builder are not known.

Dorothy died in 1930 and in 1933 Alexander remarried Kathleen Mary Dupuy (1909-1999).



Alexander along with his father, Alexander Ernest Watt established a successful dried fruits packing shed on the other side of Bullarra Road closer to Innamincka Road. Alexander and Kathleen lived at Bullarra Road until at least 1980.

Alexander S. held a number of positions on a number of boards in the Dried Fruit industry.

Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that there has been no significant change to the form or extent of the larger residence. The smaller building to the rear was built in the late 1950s and the garage on the southern boundary in 2013.



Physical Evidence:

The unusual tower in front of the single storey house is an unusual structure apparently constructed of rendered brick. The four sided structure has windows on two faces.

The detail of the internal arrangement is not known.

The ivy covering the structure creates and the close planting at the base contribute to the understanding of this structure as being much older than its construction.

A view of the house behind was not obtained, however it appears to be a typical Inter War residence.

History of Place / Site:

Built by Arthur Nelson a renowned Perth builder who was responsible for the construction of the Perth Railway Station and Bon Marche Arcade. The original building was a very small iron dwelling, which was replaced by a gravel rock house with a tower c1917.

The Old Tower house became a kindergarten during WW2 to serve the local community.

Aerial photographs indicate that the tower and the adjacent house have not changed significantly since the mid 20th century.

Physical Evidence:

This generous two storey stone and corrugated iron residence has a rectangular plan form with a pitched roof. A large gable is located off centre on the main elevation, and it features an extended roofline supported by decorative timber supports.

The main elevation is broken into different planes with a large chimney providing a focal point. A second chimney is located

There are groups of windows across the front elevation that are predominantly casement windows, but there are other windows reflecting later additions and alterations.

The home is set in a landscaped garden that features hard and soft landscaping that is appropriate to the sloping site.

History of Place / Site:

Built by Cyril Walker in the Arts and Crafts style designed by Architects Oldham, Boas and Ednie Brown and built by George Bishop, it became the home of James McCallum Smith, the owner of the Sunday Time Newspaper, an elected member of parliament and a powerful advocate for the secession movement of Western Australia.

During the war years Fisher and Gertrude Beard owned the house. They opened up the house and grounds at Cairngorm to convalescing soldiers. In 1946, the house was sold and used as a convalescent home by nursing sisters Millicent Bennett and Margaret Lefroy until the 1960's where it became a private residence again.

Archival photographs indicate that portions of the exterior were originally painted with greater contrast.

Physical Evidence:

From the available physical evidence, this place is a single storey residence with a hipped and gabled roof clad with corrugated metal sheeting that is punctuated by two painted brick chimneys. The visible gables feature some decorative timber details.

The walls are constructed of stone laid in a random rubble style and verandahs encircle the majority of the house. Where there is no verandah, pergolas join the main building. The verandah floor is stone and the roofs are supported on simple timber posts.

The residence is located in a landscaped setting that includes many mature exotic and indigenous trees.

(Note: Access was not provided at the time of the assessment)

History of Place / Site:

The owner and builder of this residence was Alfred Herbert Vincent who used stone sourced from the Greenmount Quarry. The quality of the stone masonry and workmanship was considerable, with imported French roof tiles 3 chimneys and 6 fireplaces. Water was collected and stored in a partially submerged tank. Vincent later owned Greenmount Quarry from 1920 until it closed in 1937.

Alfred Vincent was a very locally influential man who was part of the team that established Darlington's recreation area and the conversion of the vineyard cellar into a hall. The building has been extended and renovated in recent years.

Physical Evidence:

From the available information this single storey stone cottage has an asymmetrical plan form with a projecting bay that has a gable above. The gable is rendered with simple timber detail. Below the gable is a two pane casement window, with brick quoining that is consistent with the brick quoining on the corners of the building. Two tapered rendered brick chimneys are visible on the roof.

A verandah provides a covered approach to the main entrance and wraps the southern elevation. The verandah roof is an extension of the main roof and is supported on simple metal posts.

The cottage is located on a sloping site creating a second storey on the southern side of building. The lot is heavily wooded, and terracing has created paved areas adjacent to the building.

(Note: This place was not accessed for this assessment, information is based on earlier photographs)

History of Place / Site:

This stone house was built by Scottish Stonemason David Moir for Frederick Victor, brother to William who lived nearby at "The Glen" (75 Victor Road – demolished). The house has maintained its original appearance and has stayed in the Victor family hands to this present time.

Local baker Jack Gilks rented this property whilst living and working in Darlington.

Aerial photographs indicate that the verandah on the southern elevation was constructed in the early 1960s. A large addition was constructed to the rear c1982. Since that time there have been few changes and the form and extent of the original cottage can still be determined.

Physical Evidence:

This two-storey timber framed residence has a rectangular plan form and verandahs encircling the majority of the structure. The residence is located on a steep slope therefore creating access to the upper level on the north and western side. On the northern elevation is a projecting bay with a gable above, alongside which is the main entrance. This main entry door features sidelights and fanlights.

The pitched roof is clad with corrugated metal sheeting and is punctuated by two brick chimneys.

The walls are largely clad with weatherboard to sill height and fibre cement sheeting above. Windows and doors are timber framed, and from the available evidence appear to be largely casement style windows.

The balustrades on the upper verandah are simple vertical timber boards, on the lower level three horizontal timbers. The verandah posts supporting the roof on the upper level are turned decorative posts, whilst on the lower level they are simple square posts.

The foundations of the building are random rubble stone, and the verandah floors are timber boards. An external timber staircase links the upper lower verandahs and timber stairs to the ground level.

Stone terracing is evident across the lot to create level areas, whilst many mature trees are present across the site.

History of Place:

This house was built by John Napier and Annie Birks. John was a pharmacist in Perth. His daughter Phillis and son in law Frank Cave Glyde lived at the property from 1915-1921 after they married in 1913. Frank was an Accountant. The use of timber for this substantial residence appears to be relatively rare in this locality.

The property appears to be an investment and was rented out. Owners of Leithdale (5-7 Lukin Avenue) Mollie Skinner and Myra Wills appear to have rented the house and the term Halcyon was first used when Myra Wills had a child while renting this house in 1932.



Annie Birks sold the property in 1944 to Reynold George Beste. It continues to be used as a family home.

Aerial photographs indicate that the place was extended to the south in the early 1990s.



Physical Evidence:

This timber framed house has a pitched and gabled roof clad with tiles and a simple metal tube chimney can be viewed, although others may be present. The walls are clad with weatherboards and the multipaned casement windows are a dominant feature of the main façade.

The house is located on a sloping site creating space for a garage under the house. Other portions of the space under the house are accessible. This lower level of the residence has an unusual cladding of cut timber poles, which have retained their curved profile.

The main entrance is located in a small covered porch accessed by stairs adjacent to the garage.

The lot is densely wooded with mature trees and rock terracing creating level areas which are gravelled or grassed.

History of Place / Site:

This house was designed by Frederick George Bruce Hawkins (1885-1956) a notable Architect born in Durban South Africa, he trained in England and qualified as an Associate of the Royal British Institute of Architects in Feb. 1910. The residence was his family home from 1936 to 1944 for himself and his wife Frances Marguerite Stapleton (1895-1956).

He arrived in Melbourne, Australia in 1923 forming a successful firm Grainger, Little, Barlow and Hawkins then later Barlow and Hawkins. Notable buildings in Melbourne were Temple Court in 1924 in Collins Street and Spry Bros Bootery in Bourke Street. F.G.B. Hawkins came to WA in 1928 to supervise the construction of the Victoria Insurance Company building in St George's Terrace and decided to stay in Perth. The name of his residence 'Allambee' may originate with the Victorian Gippsland region.

In Perth, Hawkins undertook both commercial buildings and private residences notably the Margaret River Hotel, Dunklings, Wigmore's, Boans and Soap Distributors.



In 1944 Frederick sold this property in Darlington to the Kindergarten Association of WA where it operated to assist families during and after WW2. It operated until at least 1948 before it closed.

Aerial photographs of the property are not conclusive because of the heavily wooded nature of the site, however it appears that there has been little change in the form or extent of the residence since the mid-20th century.



Physical Evidence:

This timber framed and weatherboard clad residence has a symmetrical plan form with a pitched roof and bullnose verandah on the main elevation which partially wraps the side elevations. The roof is clad with corrugated metal sheeting and has two brick chimneys.

The verandah is supported on turned timber posts and balustrade comprises vertically fixed timber slats, matched with a smaller detail at the roof line.

The main entrance is centrally located and features sidelights and fanlights, French doors are located on either side.

The residence is located on a sloping site creating access to the rear of the house at ground level and the front verandah is elevated. The lot is landscaped and terraced with several areas for entertaining and a productive garden.

Information from the Darlington History Group states that the house is in original condition two double side fireplaces high ceilings and is relatively unchanged again, with an underground water tank.

(Note: Access was not obtained for this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

This residence was built by Walter Charles Johnson who named it Ryecroft. He was very active in the Darlington community, through his work with the Congregational Church, and contributed to the establishment of the first Darlington school and the converting of the old vineyard cellar into the Darlington Lesser Hall.

Aerial photographs indicate that the addition to the rear occurred c1984.

Physical Evidence:

This substantial home has a simple rectangular plan form and a symmetrical arrangement. The walls are constructed of the local stone laid in a random rubble style with quoining around the openings and corners. It is not clear if the quoining is painted brick or painted cut stone.

The roof is hipped and extends over the main and north elevation to create the roof over the first floor verandahs. The verandah roof is supported on timber posts. The timber balustrade on the upper level verandah features St Andrew's cross detail.

French doors are located on the ground floor and the visible windows are a combinitation of sash style and casements.

The residence is located within a large heavily wooded lot that contains other later structures.

History of Place / Site:

Built by Norman and Florence Burnell as a weekender in 1918. Norm Burnell started his business in Queen Street, Perth in 1909 dealing in retail electrical and TV rental, Kennedy sewing machines and wholesale sewing division selling Bernina, Bernette and Horn products. It is still operating under the third generation of Burnell and celebrated its Centenary.

After the Burnell family, this home was purchased by Leonard Fischer, son of Hugo Fischer of Darlington in 1927. This became the family home of Leon and Margaret Fischer who raised their 3 children here until 1944.

The place continues to be used as a family home and aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that the form and extent of the place has changed little since that time.



Physical Evidence:

This single storey timber framed residence has a rectangular plan form with a hipped roof clad in corrugated zincalume. A brick chimney is centrally located on the roof.

The entrance is centrally located in the main elevation, via a porch entry that may be a former full width verandah. The porch is enclosed by timber balusters and timber posts with decorative corner detail.

The entrance is a timber framed door with fan light above and triple pane casement widows located on either side. The entrance is approached via a flight of masonry steps which align with the pedestrian gate on the front property boundary.

The residence is located within a well maintained and landscaped property.

History of Place / Site:

This house was built by Glen Forrest resident George Robert Shepherd for Grocer Thomas Oby Ireland. It was a substantial weatherboard house with 5 rooms, verandah, large bathroom and all services.

The property was later purchased by widow Dorothy Edmondson and her five daughters. In 1936, when she purchased the property, she named it Rosendale and ran a Boarding House and Tearooms.

In 1939 the Rev. Leonard S. Quinlin Boarded with the family who had strong links to St Cuthbert's where he was the longest serving Minister. There are numerous dedications to the Edmondson family in this church.

Various members of the family lived at the property until it was finally sold in the late 1980's.

Aerial photographs indicate that the place originally comprised a much larger lot to the rear and west. Additions have been made to the original residence and within the lot although the form and extent of the original residence can still be determined.

Physical Evidence:

This single storey brick residence is located on a sloping site enabling the creation of an additional floor on one side of the building. The square plan form is wrapped by a verandah on at least three sides. The roof of the verandah is an extension of the hipped roof supported on simple square timber posts. Balustrades in the form of St Andrews cross fill between the timber posts.

Two brick chimneys are visible in the roof, and they have decorative brick detail and pots.

The house was purchased in c1930 by Victor Lyons and remains in the extended Lyons family.

Aerial photographs from the mid-20th century indicate that the place has not changed significantly in form or extent since that time and is likely to be the original footprint of the building.

This simple timber framed cottage is clad with weatherboard and fibre cement sheeting and has a hipped and skillion roof clad with corrugated metal sheeting. The cottage is located within a densely planted lot of mature trees.

Aerial photographs indicate that place has been extended since the mid 20th century, a major addition in the late 1960s. It is suggested that the original cottage comprised only two rooms and had verandahs encircling the cottage.

Physical Evidence:

This single storey timber framed residence has a rectangular plan form, with a projecting bay at one end. A verandah joins this bay and extends across the main elevation and wraps around the side elevation.

The verandah roof is an extension of the hipped and gabled roof that is supported on timber posts. Simple vertical timber balusters create the balustrade around the perimeter of the verandah.

The timber framed doors and windows are a compilation of styles. A painted brick chimney is located in the centre of the original (western) portion of the residence.

The residence is located in a large, wooded lot that includes a mix of indigenous and exotic species.

(Note: This place was not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

The property was purchased by Horatio Joseph Smith who worked for the Telegraph Office.

A 1918 Darlington Primary School photo shows both the Smith girls Phoebe and Mary in the photo so the house dates from this time and was named "Restleigh" by the Smiths.

In 1921 the Smith family added a son to the family and they named him Eric Alfred Leith as he was the first baby born at the Leithdale Estate (he used the name Leith Smith). He became a pilot in WW2 and served in England flying Lancaster Bombers. He was shot down in 1944 over Holland and was buried at Uden Cemetery along with most of his crew.

In the late 1990s, this residence underwent major alterations and additions, particularly to the east (right side of the above image).

Physical Evidence:

This timber framed and weatherboard clad residence has a hipped and gabled roof clad in corrugated metal sheeting. A brick chimney is located in the centre of the roof.

The elevations demonstrate a mix of projecting bays, verandahs and a small porch. The design is unified by the consistent use of materials and details in the timber posts, gable trim and finials.

The windows and doors are timber framed and are casement styles and sash windows. The original main elevation, on the west has a symmetrical design with a centrally placed door with fanlights and sidelights, flanked by sash windows.

Information from the Darlington History Group states that the place still features high ceilings and jarrah floorboards.

(Note: This place was not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

The original residence was designed by architect Ronald G. Oldham for Fred Maslin and his family in 1911. Construction was completed and the family moved into the house in January 1912. The original orientation of the house was looking to the west.



This two-storey residence comprises a lower level constructed of random rubble local stone with the upper level of timber frame with weatherboard cladding.

The roof is hipped with a skillion extension, portion of which is a verandah. A brick chimney with pots punctuates the roof line.

Information from the Darlington History Group states that much of the original building is intact and in good condition.



Physical Evidence:

This residence comprises the lower level built of random rubble stone construction and the upper level in timber frame with weatherboard cladding.

The roof is hipped and gabled and clad with coloured corrugated metal sheeting. The sloping slight provides ground level access to the upper level on one side of the building. On the other side a timber framed door and two windows are present in the stone work providing access to the lower level.

The timber framed doors and windows on the upper level appear to date from the original construction. The windows are casement multi pane, with a bay the location of a set of casement windows. Awnings cover some of the windows.

Information from the Darlington History Group is that the original part of the home is in very good condition and carefully renovated and extended.

The large lot in which the residence is located includes stone walls and features creating terraces within the site. A stone wall and gate on the front property boundary is likely to be from the original program of works.

History of Place / Site:

This place was built by local builder George Bishop for himself and his family in 1925.

Aerial photographs indicate that the form and extent of the place has not changed significantly since the mid-20th century although internally there are likely to have been many alterations to suit changing standards. Additional structures have been built adjacent to the original residence that have no heritage value.



Physical Evidence:

From the available information from earlier photographs this place is a timber framed structure clad with weatherboard. A gabled roof with an encircling verandah is clad with corrugated sheet metal.

The main elevation has a full width verandah which is created by the extension of the roof supported on turned timber posts. Timber slats with cut out detail form the balustrade. Access to the verandah is via a flight of timber steps.

Information from the Darlington History Group is that the building retains considerable original detail including small-wave iron walls and pressed iron ceilings.

(Note: This place was not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

In 1918 the last of the John Stone property on Dalry Rd was subdivided and advertised for sale. This land was part of the original Hillsden Estate subdivision of 1913 and was where the Stone residence was built in 1904 on the south side of Dalry Rd. In 1918 Sandover purchased most of these blocks of land along with the Stone residence.

Early Darlington residents have given accounts, confirmed by the Rate records that Sandover's house (Mrs Stone's cottage) was moved from the south side of Dalry Rd either from lot 5 or 6 of the 1918 Hillsden subdivision to Lot 4 (29 Dalry Rd) on the north side of the road around 1921. This property and house were then sold in 1922/23 to Doris Ryde. The house still retains many of the features listed in a 1918 advert for the Stone cottage mentioning it was lined with fluted iron which is still the case today.

Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that the from and extent of the building have not changed since that time.

Physical Evidence:

From the available information this residence is two-storey comprising a lower level constructed of random rubble local stone with the upper level of timber frame with weatherboard cladding. The roof is hipped and extends beyond the external walls to create a verandah on at least three sides of the building on the upper level. A brick chimney punctures the roof line near the centre of the building.

The verandah roof is supported on timber posts which are chamfered and feature a small detail at the junction with the roof. Vertical timber slats form a simple balustrade between the posts.

The windows and doors on the upper level appear to be timber framed and all are multi paned.

The lot in which it is located is sloping providing different access heights to the building on different elevations. The heavily wooded site features many mature indigenous and exotic species which contribute to the setting of the building.

(Note: This place was not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

This property was purchased in 1913 in the name of the Government Mineralogist's (Dr Edward Sydney Simpson) wife Muriel Simpson. Social notes show that the Simpson's built and used the house as a weekender.

Before c1917 the property was bought by Darlington resident Henry Gell Barker an Insurance Agent. In 1919, the name William Sewell appears in the Rates Books. Sewell from Victoria worked with the National Bank. The Sewells also used the house as a weekender until they returned to Victoria in 1923.



The house is then sold to Philip Edgerton Warburton and his wife who named it Rigi and they use it as a home. In 1927, the house was sold to a widow Evelyn Christie who used the house as Guest House and renamed it Blair Athol.

In 1932 the house is sold to a Contractor Ernest Grigg who rents it to Hilda Giles who also ran it as a Guest House and renamed it Peddars Way.

Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate the form and extent of the original cottage have not changed since that time.

Physical Evidence:

From the available information this two-storey residence has a rectangular plan form with long axis facing west. The foundations are local stone laid in a random rubble style. The ground floor (the original residence) is timber framed with weatherboard cladding and features bay windows with casement windows.

The upper level, likely also to be timber framed is clad with fibre cement sheeting and has bay windows in alignment with those below. The upper-level windows are multi pane and the bay windows have awnings over.

The roof is half gabled, with a skillion roof addition to the rear, which may have been an addition after the original construction. All roof surfaces are clad with corrugated metal sheeting.

The lot is sloping and includes stone terracing that is consistent with the residence foundations. Many mature trees and plantings create a lush informal setting for the place.

(Note: This place was not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

Built by schoolteacher Henry Ernest Pearson, as a single story home it boasted several modern attractions. It was later the home of one of Western Australia's identities, Athelstan Saw (1868-1929) who added a second story. Dr Saw was a physician, politician and university administrator. He and his wife Amy Enid Staples (1870-1950) primarily lived in West Perth and used this place as a weekender and holiday home. However, following the death of her husband in 1929, Amy Saw lived on in the house until her death in 1950. It has not been firmly established when the second storey was added but is likely to have been in the 1920s when the Saw family took possession.

The decision to purchase this property is likely to have been influenced by the close proximity of Athelstan's brother, William Allnutt Saw who lived at Holmesdale for many years.



Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that the continuation of the verandah on the northern elevation was undertaken c2004. No other major changes in the form or extent of the residence have been determined since that time.

Physical Evidence:

This single storey timber framed, and weatherboard clad residence has a gabled hip roof clad in corrugated metal sheeting. A rendered brick chimney is present in the roof.

From the available visible information the residence demonstrates a range of styles of doors and windows which reflect its evolution since 1913.

Information from the Darlington History Group states that the place remains in fairly original condition although it no longer has the expansive setting of the original home and garden.

History of Place:

Herbert Johns was the first owner of the property and had a house built there in 1913. Between 1919 and 1921 Mrs Edith Pope rented, and ran one of the first boarding houses in Darlington to support herself and her two young children. She was a war widow whose husband Charles Pope was awarded a posthumous VC in 1917. In 1922 the Mofflin family purchased the property and sold it in 1942 to the Steele Family.

The property is remembered for one of the best rose gardens (1,000 roses) in Western Australia in the 1920s and 1930s. If was used as the venue for annual fund raising fetes.

Aerial photographs from the mid 20th century indicate that the southern elevation which addresses Dalry Road has been altered on several occasions. The covered entry, or verandah, is likely to be original. The original main elevation was probably the western elevation as the driveway entrance was from Hillsden Road.

The form and extent of the original residence can still be determined.

Physical Evidence:

From the available physical evidence, the original portion of this residence is constructed from local stone in a random rubble style. Later additions are in a range of materials and the form of the original gabled roof has been retained and extended to accommodate the later insertions.

Ruins of former structures on the site have been retained in contrast to the later structures.

(Note: This place as not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

Mr Charles Stuart Russell Palmer (1858-1937 (engineer who succeeded the celebrated C Y O'Connor as engineer in Chief for the Public Works Department) built this house with stonework that is preserved within the house. It is understood that a much grander structure was initially planned but never completed.

Palmer and his family did not have a long association with the property as he relocated to London in 1904.

The incomplete home was a part-time residence by architect and orchardist Lewis Henry Duval until around the late '20s, when it fell into more and more disrepair and built a reputation for local kids as the "spooky house" t.

Subdivided in the 1960s, the lot was purchased in the early 70s by architect Ray Lefroy, who built a home around the ruins. An aerial photograph of the site in 1965 shows that the structure had no roof, by 1970 the building had a new corrugated sheet metal roof and an addition to the west.

The building was again rebuilt in 2008 to incorporate additional elements but portions of the former ruin have been retained.

Physical Evidence:

From the available visible evidence this single storey brick residence has a asymmetric plan form with a projecting bay that includes a series of aluminium framed windows. Adjacent to the bay is a covered porch or verandah where the main entrance is located. Aluminium windows are also located in this elevation. The roof over this entrance is supported on turned timber posts.

The roof is gabled hip and clad with corrugated metal sheeting.

A large shed or carport is located adjacent to the residence and the remainder of the lot is cleared apart from many mature trees on the boundary.

History of Place / Site:

This residence the second home built by local identity Hugo Emil Fischer (1875-1963) using handmade bricks. His son Peter and his wife Win, nee Little lived there until 1967, adding to the residence and continuing to operate a dairy and poultry farm from the property.

Aerial photographs of the place since the mid 20th century indicate that there was an addition on the northern elevation of the place in the late 1990s. However, the form and extent of the residence has remained largely unchanged since the mid 20th century.

Physical Evidence:

The available visible evidence relating to this place indicates it is a single storey rendered brick structure with a terracotta tile gabled hip roof.

The windows and doors appear to be timber framed with the windows arranged in groups of three casements.

The sloped site has stone walls creating terraces which is consistent with the low wall on the front property boundary. A garage is located close to the property boundary and it is constructed in the same style and materials as the residence.

(Note: This place as not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

This brick stucco house was built by contractor S. Cresswell for Walter William Saw (1898-1971), son of William Allnut Saw who owned Holmesdale and was on a part of his father's subdivided estate. Walter married Alison Gaze (1998-1986) daughter of Frederick Owen Gaze who was cofounder of Ezywalkins Store and in WW1 was the Egyptian Commissioner of the Comfort Fund.

Walter and Alison Saw relocated to Peppermint Grove in 1929.

For a number of years Frederick and Constance Gaze lived in the house with Constance holding fundraising events at the property. When Frederick died in 1932 Constance placed a dedication plaque in his honour at St Cuthberts and donated the church's first bell in 1934.

The naming of the property appears to be attributed to Charles Albert Kendall Manager of the Ford Motor Company during his brief ownership.

In 1960, Robert Charles Jennings purchased the property where he was serving at his last school, Darlington Primary, before retiring. He was one of the WW1 soldiers retrained as teachers after the war. He was awarded a Military Medal for his bravery as a stretcher bearer recovering wounded men while under fire at Passchendaele in 1918.

Aerial photographs of the place since the mid 20th century indicate that the place has undergone no significant change in its form or extent since that time. It is clear however that the place was originally located in a generous lot with formal gardens and minimal buildings adjacent.

Physical Evidence:

From the available visible evidence this residence is located on a steeply sloping block which provides access to the upper floor on one side and the lower floor on the opposite side.

The building is constructed of local stone laid in a random rubble arrangement with quoining around all openings and the corners of the building. It is not clear if the quoining is rendered brick or just render.

Portion of the lower external walls are timber weatherboard. Verandahs are present on two sides of the building with the roof created from the extension of the hipped roof clad in terracotta tiles. The verandah roofs are supported on simple square posts with balustrades between them featuring St Andrew's cross design.

According to information from the Darlington History Group much of this home is still in original condition. It includes an impressive entry from which you can go upstairs to the second story or downstairs to the ground floor.

History of Place / Site:

This residence was built by Stanley Dawes Gomme (c1890-1966) the manager of the State Sawmills for himself and his wife Doris Evelyn Gomme (c1890-1978) and their family as a holiday cottage. Their permanent home was in Claremont.

Later owners and occupants have not been determined.

Aerial photographs indicate that the form and extent of the residence have not changed since the mid 20th century.

Physical Evidence:

From the available information this residence is a split level home constructed on a sloping site. The main construction is local stone laid in a random rubble style with brick quoining around the openings and corners of the building.

A verandah across the main elevation is likely to be an original feature. There have been later additions in timber weatherboard on the lower level, and the balustrade on the upper level is a later addition.

The gabled hip roof is clad with coloured corrugated sheeting and the double gables at the front have timber detail.

The generous grounds are landscaped with many mature trees.

History of Place / Site:

This residence was built by local Scottish Stonemasons Charles and David Moir for Scottish born William Scrymgeour (1867-1931) an engineer and investor and his wife Eleanor nee Liddel. Sadly he took his own life in 1931 at this place, apparently due to money worries. His wife Eleanor stayed on in the house until at least the early 1940s according to the Electoral Rolls.

Later Reg Caulfield, the local postman and a major player in setting up the local Darlington Review newspaper was a resident.

More recently the well known photographer Richard Woldendorp was a rental resident for several years.

Aerial photographs indicate that the projecting bay on the front elevation was built c2006, initially without a roof and by late 2007 the pitched roof separate to the main house was built. The carport adjacent was built in early 2015.

The form and extent of the original residence can be readily determined.

Physical Evidence:

From the limited physical evidence this place is of timber frame construction with weatherboard cladding. It has a gabled roof with small adjoining gables clad with corrugated metal sheeting.

History of Place / Site:

First owned by Hastings Carew Reid who built the house as a weekender. He was the Chief Hansard Reporter in WA and was awarded the OBE in 1952.

In 1919, widow Bertha Ednie Brown (her husband was John Ednie Brown Conservator of Forests) purchased the house and used it as a weekender. Physical Evidence:

From the available physical evidence this two storey stone residence has a symmetrical plan form with the portion to the rear in the above image a later addition.

The gabled hip roof is clad with corrugated sheet metal and extends beyond the external walls to create a verandah on all elevations. The verandah roof on the upper level and the floor above on the ground level are supported on metal posts. The balustrade panels and the corner detail between the roof and posts are later additions.

The windows appear to be timber framed and two over two sash style. The only visible door also appears to be timber with a fanlight.

The grounds are landscaped and feature many mature plantings which provide an appropriate setting for the residence.

(Note: This place as not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

This property was first purchased by Frank Leonard Walters in 1914 who was a Signwriter in partnership with Walter Paterson Meston. He built a stone house which has over the years been enlarged keeping the same style.

Other owners were the Boyd family and in the 1960's Robert and Janet Holmes A Court lived here. Robert purchased the house as a wedding present to Janet nee Ranford who grew up in Swan View.

Aerial photographs indicate that the addition to the rear was added c2004. Since that time there have been no significant changes to the form or extent of the residence.

Physical Evidence:

This timber framed single storey residence has a symmetrical plan form with a gabled hip roof clad in corrugated coloured metal sheeting. A small projecting bay is located centrally in the main elevation.

The walls are clad with unpainted weatherboard to mid window height and fibre cement sheeting above.

The windows are timber framed and multipane casement style in a range of dimensions. The visible door appears to be a later addition.

Information from the Darlington History Group states that the place retains most of its original features including small outbuildings in the property.

History of Place / Site:

Designed by the Architect Herbert Parry and purpose built as a Tearoom for the owner William Goldsmith Burges (in 1952 he was awarded the OBE) who owned Tipperary in York.

It was run as a tearoom, guest house and chemist shop by Florrie and Robert William Greville from 1926-1939.

A later resident was Wally Coxon a Radio Engineer who built and serviced radios for outback communication and the Flying Doctor.

Aerial photographs indicate there have been minimal changes to the form and extent of this place since the mid 20th century.

Physical Evidence:

Because of the minimal physical evidence it can only be determined that this single storey residence is built of stone in the random rubble construction style with a gabled roof clad in corrugated metal sheeting.

The details of the doors and windows appear to be of a later program of works, not the original construction.

The property is heavily wooded with many mature trees and access via a long driveway makes visibility of this place difficult.

(Note: This place as not accessed as part of this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

This property was one of a number that Joseph Hope owned in Darlington but was the property where he chose to build a small weekender constructed of weatherboard and stone. Joseph was a surveyor (he later worked in the Lands Dept as Chief Draftsman) and worked with his son in law Carl Klem who was also a Surveyor (who later worked in the Titles Office and Town Planning) as Hope and Klem a surveying business.

Joseph married Annie Throssell (George Throssell's daughter and sister to V.C. winner Hugo Throssell, husband of Katharine Susannah Prichard). A road off Beenong was originally called Hope Rd but has since been renamed when it joined Maslin Crescent.

For a brief period from 1947-1952 the house was owned by author and poet Dorothy Hewitt when she married lawyer Lloyd Davies. Her Autobiography "Wildcard" recalls her time in Darlington.

From 1963-1980 Architect Eugene (Gene) Mapp owned the property and designed some of the innovative houses in the hills.

Aerial photographs indicate the there have been minimal changes to the form and extent of the residence apart from an addition in the early 1990s to the northern side of the residence.

Physical Evidence:

Excerpt from the NTWA Assessment, 2008 by Dr Fiona Bush.

The Language Classroom and the Shelter Shed are timber framed structures clad with weatherboards supported on timber stumps. The Language Classroom is covered with a corrugated metal gable roof while the Shelter Shed has a skillion roof clad with corrugated metal. Both buildings are located in the south-east corner of Darlington School. Bitumen playgrounds are located to the south and east of the Classroom.

The entrance to the Language Classroom is on the north-west side and a secondary entrance on the western side. The skillion roofed entrance provides access to the classroom and a storage space on the western side of the skillion roofed area. The interior of the building is clad with canite sheeting with a plaster ceiling. Four, evenly spaced windows are set in the southern elevation.

The Shelter Shed is open on the southern side and the skillion roof is supported by timber posts. The ceiling and walls are unlined; the floor is tongued and grooved timber boards. A slatted seat runs around the two short sides and the long northern side. The building is in fair condition. A newer weatherboard structure butts onto the rear (northern) of the building.

History of Place / Site:

Excerpt from the NTWA Assessment, 2008 by Dr Fiona Bush.

Darlington was first settled by Europeans in 1883 when Dr Alfred Waylen purchased 150 acres of land on which he established a vineyard which he named 'Darlington'. The second stage of the Eastern Railway, between Guildford and Chidlow's Wells (Chidlow), was completed in 1884 and suburban lots close to Waylen's Vineyard were surveyed and advertised for sale. A railway siding was erected for the vineyard in 1889. Orchards were established in the area and by 1912 a petition was presented to the Director for Education by residents requesting a state school. Local resident, Mr V.K. Jones, offered the use of a room in his home (Leithdale) for the school. This arrangement met with the approval of the Minister for Education and the school opened on 28 May 1912 under the direction of Miss Emma Hogan, with an enrolment of 14 children.



A site was purchased to the south of Leithdale in April 1913 and a single room classroom was erected by Mr C.F. Jesuman for £283. The children moved into their new school on 28 October. As more settlers moved into the district numbers at the school grew and requests were made for a shelter shed and quarters (1914) and an additional classroom in 1915. An additional classroom was added to the eastern side of the existing room in 1916 together with a shelter shed.

Enrolments had increased to 94 by 1923 leading the director of the Claremont Teacher's College, Mr Rooney, to complain about the cramped conditions at the school. He commented on the inefficient use of space and also that the shelter shed was poorly located in the middle of the playground. He provided plans to the Director of Education which included the addition of a new room on the western side of the first classroom.

Mr Rooney's recommendations were for the 1916 building to become the Infants Classroom, the 1913 building could be used for girls' domestic science and needlework, while the new classroom could be set up as the boys' manual arts room. The PWD drew up plans for the building which were very similar in design to the existing two classrooms with the exception that the proposed building had a wider verandah area which could be used for manual arts. A memo by the Director of Education notes that Darlington was "a special observation school". The rather rapid approval for the allocation of £500 for the construction of the new classroom and shifting the shelter shed, seems to indicate that Rooney's recommendations were held in high regard and that suggestions made by him should be implemented immediately. Mr F. L. Gurr the successful contractor with a tender of £390.7.7.

The new classroom was ready for occupation on 29 April 1924 and the shelter shed was shifted to lie in line with the new building. All three classrooms were a standard PWD timber classroom design. The new classroom was specifically designed to cater to Boys' Manual Arts activities.

A new classroom was also added in 1956 and in 1964 an Administration Block with 2 additional classrooms was constructed to the north-west of the original block. This new building formed the new nucleus of the school and additional rooms were added in 1979. In the 1980s, the 1913 and 1916 classrooms were demolished leaving only the 1924 room and the shelter shed.

In 2019, the roof cladding of the two buildings was replaced with contemporary corrugated metal sheeting at the same time the roof cladding of all the school buildings were replaced.

In 2024, these structures are still used by the school for educational purposes.





Physical Evidence:

From the available information the place comprises an amalgamation of structures from the early 20th century until the early 21st century. The detail of the structures and their relationships to each other is unknown.

(Note: This place was not accessed for this assessment)

History of Place / Site:

From the available information two workers cottages were built on this site c1900 by local businessmen and land owners, Alfred Waylen and Josceline Amherst who established the Darlington vineyard. The two timber cottages were to accommodate some of their workers, one of whom was believed to be the foreman, Mr Mumme.

In c1916, the land was leased and later sold to George Henry Ranger (c1882-1964) and his wife Adelaide Vinetta Tilbrook (c1892-1984). By the time the couple settled on this land they had 3 children and their fourth was born at the property in 1922.

Harry (as he was commonly known) Ranger maintained a dairy and wood yard at the property and worked throughout the district in a diversity of trades.

It is believed one of the original workers cottages was burnt down by Harry Ranger and the other was incorporated into a later stone addition as can be seen in the c1920 photograph below. It is possible that the earlier cottage was later removed as aerial photographs from the mid 20th century suggest this earlier cottage was no longer extant.

Harry Ranger built the new family home over several years and archival photographs suggest it was built of local stone.

Aerial photographs indicate that a new addition was constructed to the northern elevation in the early 1990s.



Physical Evidence:

The remaining evidence of the seven former Chidlow Army Camp comprise concrete foundations and other remnant structures located across a widespread area that is predominantly reserve although some private property has evidence of the former camps.

Since the demolition of the camps in 1946 there have been ongoing discoveries of artefacts relevant to its former use. There is potential for further discoveries across the site.

This assessment is related to all camps including Camp 4 which is currently included on the Local Heritage Survey.

History of Place / Site:

Excerpt from Head for the Hills! The History of Chidlow WWII Army Camp 4 1942-1946, Bob Sheppard, Mundaring and Hills Historical Society, 2021.

Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbour on 7-8 December 1941, the fall of Singapore on 15 February 1942 and the subsequent air raids on Australian towns, Australia's military Chiefs of Staff considered the nation's situation, and it was decided the Port Kembla-Sydney-Newcastle-Lithgow area was vital and should be defended.

In February 1942 the Chiefs of Staff reviewed the situation following the fall of most of the islands to the north of Australia. They recognised that the future for Australia's defence relied heavily on the country becoming a base for the USA military to launch a



counterattack against the Japanese. What was fortunate for the southwestern corner of Western Australia was the government's military intelligence which believed the United States Naval Forces gave orders to drop back to Fremantle as it was determined that Fremantle is important as a potential fleet base and has valuable fuel stocks.

Military strategists, both in Australia and Britain, began to see the value of Fremantle as an important base for the protection of WA and the Indian Ocean in general. It was determined troops in WA would be increased to a Division (around 10000 men).

In the absence of trained regular soldiers in WA, with most Australian troops fighting in North Africa, it was necessary to bring troops from the east for the defence of the state. A staging camp was required to cater for the influx of troops. Chidlow, also then known as Chidlows or Chidlows Well, in the hills east of Perth, was chosen for this camp.

In March 1942 plans were prepared by the Department of Interior for the construction of staging camps at Chidlow for 5000 men. The five thousand troops, consisting of a Brigade and ancillary units, were expected at Chidlow within 13 days of the acceptance of tenders for the construction. The Army issued instructions that this work should take priority over all other Army work.

None of the builders who submitted tenders had the manpower and capability to construct the initial messes and latrines required, being eight groups of three buildings, and the government initially decided to split the project and allow three construction groups to begin the work on 24 buildings. The successful builders were A. Fewster, N. Ellis and J. H. Motteram.

It was soon realised the Army required seven camps in Chidlow, each capable of housing 600 men and 3 camps for 300 men. Required facilities were;

- 14 showers
- 14 Officers latrines
- 14 Other ranks latrines
- 14 Q Stores
- 10 Administration Huts
- 7 C type men's messes and kitchens for 500
- 3 ESB type men's messes and kitchens for 250
- T C type officers messes
- 7 C type Sergeants" messes
- 3 C type combined officers" and sergeants" messes.

Additional tenders were called for. The successful tenders were from Angell and Clarke, Sandwell and Mood, Hawkins and Sons, and T. Snooks and Son.

Of the seven proposed camps, Camp Four was the largest in area and closest to the Chidlow townsite. To expedite works the government was given wide ranging powers. Under Regulation 54 of the *National Security (General) Regulations* the government had the ability to take over any private land required for national defence.

The work at the camps was supervised Mr H. A. Hammond, a surveyor, who stayed at the Sawyers Valley Hotel. While works proceeded as briskly as possibly troops arrived and were expected to 'rough it' in the bush while the camps were being constructed.

Troops the 6 Infantry Brigade arrived at the Chidlow Camp in March- April 1942. Around 650 members of the 7 Field Regiment RAA, arrived at Chidlow from New South Wales in July 1942.



The seven campsites were completed by September 1942 and a functional Brigade camp complex was established with the seven different camps enabling a spread of resources and functions. Over 115 units camped at Chidlow Army Camp where it functioned as a training camp and as a transit location in the period 1942-1944. The activities undertaken by the troops at the Chidlow Camps are not detailed in the documentary evidence but the Mundaring and Hills Historical Society hold some personal histories of experiences at the camps.

By 1946, the camps were seen as being surplus to government requirements and the 111 buildings, and sundry equipment, in the camps were auctioned on site by Gregson's Auctioneers and Valuators.

Following the auction of the buildings only those elements of the camp which could not be easily removed remained. Concrete foundations, sullage pits and the extensive network of grey water drains were the most tangible reminders of the camp.

Much of the land used by the camps reverted back to previous landowners and a section of Camp 4 was included in the nearby Betty Street Reserve. Some of the remaining concrete floors were used as shed floors by private land owners.

The remnants of the camps within the reserves which have been largely undisturbed are legible as

In June 2011 the Mundaring and Hills Historical Society sought to raise the profile of the Chidlow Camps. The society carried out metal detecting in the camps and this, and other, work resulted in Tom Hogarth and Graham McKenzie-Smith creating the *Chidlow Army Camps WWII Report*.

In 2021, Camp 4 was included on the Shire of Mundaring Local Heritage Survey and Heritage List.

Statement of Significance

- The concrete pads of Chidlow Camps have some aesthetic value as remnant structures in the relatively undisturbed bushland.
- The place provides an example of Western Australia's change in strategic importance due to the entry of Japan into WWII.
- The remains have historic value for their association with WWII and the intense
 period of training by the AIF in preparation for overseas service. The number of
 troops in Chidlow and the density of construction in the bushland would have
 affected the small Chidlow community.
- The remains and their surrounds have scientific value for the potential to provide valuable information about the lives of soldiers deployed to train and protect Western Australia during the latter part of WWII.



- The place provides the potential to identify and confirm the layout of such camps and whether they deviated from plans initially drawn by the Department of Defence.
- The place has social value as members of the Mundaring Community have undertaken their own archaeological investigations and lobbied state and local government to ensure the history of the pace is recorded.



Physical Evidence:

There is little evidence of the racecourse remaining. Trees along the southern side of Park Road indicate what was the northern boundary of the racecourse site.

History of Place / Site:

Until the 1950s, the area remained largely undeveloped. The earliest development in the area was the result of horse racing. The Helena Vale Race club formed in 1897, and by 1900 had opened a horse racing track in an area to the north of Bellevue. The track became so popular that a branch line of the Eastern Railway was extended to the site.

By 1904 a grandstand had been completed, and at the end of that same year, hotel owner Thomas Wilkins opened the East Midland Hotel (now the Darling Range Tavern) due to the large number of race-goers. Horse racing continued at the Helena Vale Racecourse until 1969. The area that was once occupied by the race course is now a light industrial area.
